Imagine a Philippines where justice is swift and fair, where court trials hinge on scientific evidence as the primary basis for convicting criminals. Picture a government that adequately funds all branches of forensic science, enabling them to stay current with the latest technologies. Envision an independent institution dedicated to providing all necessary scientific analyses for criminal cases, delivering accurate, authentic, and unbiased findings-unaffected by race, gender, social standing, or any form of discrimination. Finally, imagine a society where every Filipino fully understands the potential of forensics, ensuring that only the guilty are convicted, while the innocent are protected.

As students pursuing a Bachelor of Forensic Science, we were thrilled on our first day of classes. What began as a mere curiosity about police investigations, sparked by fictional series, had grown into a genuine opportunity to understand the reality behind those successful convictions. We were eager to learn how perpetrators are identified and brought to justice. This excitement stayed with us for a long time. We were especially keen to take subjects that revealed how accurately the depictions on digital platforms reflect real life. However, our satisfaction waned when we realized how far behind our country lags in terms of equipment and technology for forensic examinations. We are still in the early stages of proving the capabilities of forensic science. For instance, forensic DNA databases, which are crucial for identifying individuals involved in crimes, are well-established in countries like the United Kingdom, Malaysia, and the United States. Yet, here in the Philippines, we are still awaiting the approval of Senate Bill 2474, authored by Senator Ronald Dela Rosa, which aims to create a national DNA database-a proposal that still has a long way to go before it becomes law (Senate of the Philippines, 2024). Can we keep up with the rapid advancements in forensic science, or will we remain content with our limited resources?

As we progress in our studies, we are becoming more aware of what lies ahead in our careers. We've reached a point where we are exposed to the agencies that train uniformed personnel and provide forensic services in the country. We are grateful to the National Forensic Science Training

Institute (NFSTI) for allowing us to complete our internship in their modest office. Our time there was a roller-coaster ride.

At times, we felt reassured that we had chosen the right path, as the institute continues to provide valuable opportunities for forensic science students. The possibility of a board exam for our program is now being discussed, and we just need to be patient. But we don't always feel motivated. There are moments of internal crisis when we hear people question why we chose such a risky path with uncertain employment prospects. Will our jobs really be uncertain?

On the other hand, our internship at the PNP Regional Forensic Unit 4A gave us a chance to experience the real work of a forensic examiner. We rotated through various divisions, including firearms identification, chemistry, medico-legal, and physical identification. The staff were welcoming and eager to help us become the best versions of ourselves, preparing us for future careers in this field. We engaged in tasks like test-firing, analyzing cartridge and bullet markings, conducting inventories, performing drug tests, and observing autopsies. Did we make the right choice, or did we just waste our time?

We made the right choice! We still see how important forensic science is, and would definitely want to be part of making an impact in the development of our justice system.

He emphasized the importance of an interdisciplinary approach in criminal justice, where knowledge from various fields can be integrated to solve complex problems.

members from the uniformed services. The students were eager to learn about the real-world applications of their studies and how they can prepare themselves for successful careers. Mr. Santiago highlighted the importance of continuous learning and adaptability in a rapidly evolving field like criminal justice and character development. He also discussed emerging trends, such as the growing role of technology in crime investigations training and the increasing demand for professionals who are not only skilled in traditional criminal justice roles but also adept at handling technological advancements and data analysis.
